


WHERE IS THE U.S. MINT?

The U.S. Mint has six locations around the country.

Learn about each of them below.



FORT KNOX BULLION DEPOSITORY

Location: Fort Knox, Kentucky

First opened to store gold, the U.S. Bullion Depository makes no coins.



WEST POINT MINT

Location: West Point, New York

Makes commemorative, uncirculated, proof, and bullion coins. It also stores precious metals.



SAN FRANCISCO MINT

Location: San Francisco, California

Makes commemorative coins and proof coins. Features state-of-the-art robotics used for packaging.



Location: Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Makes circulating and commemorative coins, uncirculated sets, medals, and coin and medal dies. Also gives public tours!



DENVER MINT

Location: Denver, Colorado

Makes circulating and commemorative coins, uncirculated sets, coin dies, and stores gold and silver. Provides public tours!



MINT HEADQUARTERS

Location: Washington, District of Columbia

Responsible for research, marketing, business management, and this coloring book!




CIRCULATING COINS






COINS OVER TIME

Coin designs have changed throughout history. Our coins can show people, symbols, words, or mythical figures. Which designs have you seen before? Circle them!













HALF DOLLAR




AMERICAN WOMEN QUARTERST PROGRAM

CELIA CRUZ QUARTER

Celia Cruz was a Cuban-American cultural icon and one of the most popular Latin singers of the 20th century. Her signature phrase "¡AZÚCAR!" is featured on her coin design.




ZITIKALA-ŠA QUARTER

Zitkala-Ša was a writer, composer, educator, and political activist for Native American rights. Her quarter features a cardinal to symbolize her name, which translates to "Red Bird."



Native American \$1 Coin

The Native American \$1 Coin Program honors Native American tribes and individuals. Each year the Mint makes a new reverse (tails) design. The 2024 design honors the passage of the 1924 Indian Citizenship Act.



Greatest Generation Commemorative Coins

The U.S. Mint makes some coins to collect rather than to spend. These coins are called commemorative coins. They honor people, places, and events. The 2024 Greatest Generation coin program recognizes the service and sacrifice of American soldiers and civilians during World War II.



Harriet Tubman Commemorative Coins

The 2024 Harriet Tubman Commemorative Coin Program celebrates her 200th birthday. The coins show Harriet Tubman's life and work. The silver dollar designs shown below reflect her work on the Underground Railroad.



American Innovation \$1 Coins

The American Innovation dollar coin designs show a significant innovation, innovator, or group of innovators from each of the 50 states, five U.S. territories, and the District of Columbia.



The 2024 Missouri coin highlights the achievements of scientist George Washington Carver.

The 2024 Illinois coin design honors the steel plow.




The 2024 Maine coin design celebrates the defibrillator.



The American Innovation \$1 Coin representing Alabama recognizes the Saturn V rocket. The Saturn V was developed to support NASA's Apollo missions to the moon. The rocket was made in Huntsville, Alabama.


COLLECTING

Store coins in protective cases or albums. Keep them in a safe place!


